### The Church Building

The fabric of the Church, is, in the mind of the church historian, unexceptional. Personally, I think that as a whole, it is attractive and comfortable in its size. The tower is of red sandstone built in the 'perpendicular' style (possible 1400-1450). The chancel arch is as old, if not older, and presumably the chancel is essentially the same age, but restored internally and externally in the 19th century. From the 15th century to 1864, there existed a Nave and South Aisle only. In 1864 the Nave was completely re-built and a North Aisle (and Vestry) added. On both these occasions the architect and builder were probably William Watson of Napton. In the wall of the South Aisle where the ancient altar stood is a piscine, again from 1400-1450, thankfully retained in the rebuilding. Hopefully, in the future that 'corner' may be made more attractive, and perhaps highlighted by some feature.

## 1973

### To prove that village life is not dull by Mrs. C. Gardener

Mrs. Marlene Sedgely said to me "Chas will you write a piece for the Parish News" because folk often say to her "Isn't it dull living where you live?" she replies "Not a bit when you live opposite Chas - there's so many things happen such as the afternoon when a Piebald pony pulling a gypsy waggon complete with a half type lurcher dog arrived. We had been told via telephone that a waggon was parked at the Fosse Cross Roads, and lost no time in going to have a chat. Sure enough they were just enjoying a quiet drink and immediately invited us to join them. We talked waggons for the next hour or so - incidentally travelling folk always refer to their homes as waggons not caravans. They were quite interested to hear of our four waggons and decided that the next day (if they could 'make it' up Ufton Hill) with one horse, they would call and see us. Sure enough the following afternoon they arrived and over a cup of tea we discovered that these travellers were none other than Don Partridge, folksinger (he had songs in top of the pop charts a couple of years ago) and his wife Anki, she is Swedish, a very nice person, writing a book about her travels. They had one little girl and were then on their way to the New Forest where they would await the arrival of their second child, this was one of the causes of their interest in our waggons, because with two children, they would be needing a larger wagon and this would mean two horses to help up the hills. After leaving us they spent the night on the land at the bottom of the hill and next morning left for the New Forest expecting to 'make it' in about ten days. They had spent three months in Sweden, collected the horse and wagon from a farm near Leicester where it had been parked for the winter.

The next day we had visitors sent to us via the Ministry of Information, from the New Hebrides - we were most surprised to learn from them that the New Hebrides was 600miles east of Australia and not north of Scotland. They also called on Mr. Neal to watch him making chairs.

Life here at the Bungalow as you will see is far from dull. At the moment time is going against us - while trying to paint one of our waggons inside and out to go to the Royal Show, it is to be on exhibition in the forestry section. There certainly should be more than 24hours in a day.



Brief words were spoken by Mr. Ivan Bennett and Mrs. Shirley Cox, both ex-pupils, on behalf of the School Managers; Mr. S.J. Way sent a written message; and Mr. Keith Collins spoke on behalf of Staff past and present. Two songs were sung by the Infants' Dept. under the direction of Mrs. Baker, and later two more songs were sung by the Junior Dept. Mrs. Lois Powell, School Secretary, presented Mr. Lowes with an album of over 200 signatures of present and past pupils. Lisa Battam presented Mrs. Lowes with a lovely bouquet, Garry Noon presented John Lowes with a gardening token, and Sylvia Mackie presented Mr. Lowes with a book token. A cheque for £60 was presented to the family by Alderman Mrs. M.I. Bankes-Price. There followed the exciting presentation of an oils painting of St. Michael's Church, by the Women's' Institute, painted by Mr. Noel Newsome of Marton; and then the gift of a nice wooden bowl from the lady helpers at the Christmas Party, made by Mr. Chas. Gardener and presented by Mrs. F. Bennett; and finally a marcasite brooch from the Church Council to Mrs. Lowes in recognition of the help given with the children of the Church Choir, and in playing for services, this last was presented by Mary Clarke from the Choir. Coffee and biscuits were served by lady helpers to conclude this evening.

The total of the collection made by the School Managers amounted to £66.05d. £6 was given to the Lowes in gifts, and a cheque for £60. 142 gift envelopes were handed in and 53 direct donations; as some of these gifts represented whole families, something like over 250 people contributed.

those days you disposed of your own rubbish, carried your own lantern in the street, pushed your own cart out of the mire of what went for roads, and provided your own water. The levy was made 6 or 7 times a year, so it was a fairly hefty contribution, as nothing was given in return. As the total rate only produced at the most £37, those who were in need must have had a thin time of it, although they probably fared better than their opposite numbers in the towns.

Interesting also is the fact that the Churchwardens had civil duties in these times, and sometimes combined with their office the duty of Overseer of the Poor. The Church was the only national organisation to be found in every parish before Local Authorities existed.

The name of Theo Biddulph appears as a trustee in the book, and the Biddulph family of Birdingbury or Birbury as it was probably called then, were also Lords of the Manor of Stockton about this time. Other names of interest between 1824 and 1827 are the Reverend Samuel Perkins, who was Rector. Joseph Beck had a shop in 1826 with a rateable value of 1/- if the book is to be believed. John Cooper Jnr., was in residence at the School House, then situated in The Square: he was the first schoolmaster in Stockton and died at the early age of 28 years. Esther Sharman had to pay a rate of 1/- for a 'Parler' in 1826; it sounds as if she went 'one better than the Joneses' and built an extension to her house, but perhaps it was just a bay window she had. William Witherington had a Brick Yard in 1827; I wonder where? In the same year John Webb had a Blacksmith Shop. In 1827 William Finch owned a Bakehouse. Both William Horley and John Cooper Snr., are charged for Pantry; perhaps that, too, was an extension to their homes.

### 1970

#### July

#### Round and About by 'Villager'

#### 108 Different Woods

Mr. Chas Gardner exhibited 108 egg cups at the Royal Show, each made of a different wood and shape. Mr. Neville Neal and Lawrence also had a display of their furniture craft in the Forestry Section at the Royal Show.

#### Example of Handwriting

Mrs. G. Sharples found an old exercise book of her father's, the late George Wilks, when he was a boy, and sent it to the County Museum in Warwick. It has been on display in an exhibition entitled 'Unwillingly to School' to commemorate the Act of 1870 which brought in compulsory education.

#### Stockton Carnival

A profit of £203.19s.5d. was made. Old bridesmaids' dresses are required to dress up people for next year's carnival.

#### Car Rally

A very enjoyable evening was had by young and old, ending up in the Vicarage Garden at Edge Hill, where Mr. & Mrs. Arnold Adkins were waiting to serve us with coffee. The winners were Mr. & Mrs. Grant Matthews of Pear Tree Cottage, with Mrs. G. Sharples and her team a close second. The event was very well organized by John and Rosemary Skinner.

#### Churchyard

At the beginning of May 43 headstones were moved on the North side of the church, under Faculty Permission. Gerry Duckett very skilfully used the hydraulic hoist on his tractor to do the lifting, assisted by two men from the congregation. We are determined to finish the job of slab-laying this year. All the dirt has now been dug away from the walls in readiness. Assistance in cement-mixing and slab-laying would be appreciated during July and August if only for an hour. Our grateful thanks to Gordon Sharples for bringing his digger and dumper truck down, and working two whole evenings to clear the large amount of earth from around the tower.

### August

#### Parish Rates

A few months ago, an old Parish Rate Book was sent to the Rector in the post. It belonged to Stockton and somehow had become mixed with Mr. Gillett's (a former Rector) belongings. When Mr. Gillett's successor in the Chaplaincy in the Scilly Isles took over, he discovered the book and returned it.

It makes interesting reading because of the names of the families in the Parish between 1823 and 1827. The purpose of the levy decided at a Vestry meeting was for 'The necessary relief of the Poor of the Parish' and was 6d. in the pound, and even 1/- in the pound on two occasions. At present the rates in Stockton stand at 14/2d. in the pound - 13/11d General Rate and 3d for Parish Purposes. In

**Major William Arthur Weaver** and his family moved to Stockton House in 1945. He was born in Peterborough in 1885 and died on 25 August 1968. He was an accomplished engineer and became the joint owner of Morton & Weaver Ltd. and the Coventry Victor (Ltd). Morton & Weaver were machine tool manufacturers at 139 Cox Street, Coventry. In 1904 Major Weaver designed and produced a horizontally opposed engine and in 1906 one of those engines powered the first monoplane in the UK, the Weaver Ornithoplane that had its maiden flight in 1910. They also supplied engines for several motorcycle makes and a three-wheeled runabout (the Super Six). In 1917 they manufactured universal cutter grinders. In 1924 Morton & Weaver was dissolved. Weaver and Morton continued to run Coventry Victor (Ltd) who made motorcycles from 1919 - 1935. Major Weaver is buried with his wife Florence in Stockton churchyard. There is also a window in the North Wall of the church with the following inscription “ *To the Glory of God and in Remembrance of those of this parish who laid down their lives in the World Wars 1914 - 1918 and 1939 - 1945. This window was given by W A WEAVER of Stockton House*”. Major Weaver was awarded an MBE in 1960 for services to the Sea Cadet Corps in Coventry and District. Weaver’s Way on the new Taylor Wimpey site was named in his honour.

### Happy 103rd Birthday wishes to Mrs. Freda Spraggett On the 11th July

Freda was born on 11th July 1918 as one of the 12 children of George and Theresa Lockley who lived at Mount Pleasant and then Victoria Terrace in Stockton.

She still recalls taking her father's lunch to him at Cally works between morning and afternoon school.

She worked in service at Arnold Lodge School in Leamington with her sister, who became Kath Evetts and then towards the end of the Second World War found better paid work with the Standard Motor Company at Canley, Coventry on aircraft parts inspection.

Her memories of her time at the Standard, which became Standard Triumph, are recorded for posterity at the British Motor Museum at Gaydon and in normal times can be heard on headphones by visitors to the Museum.

She married her husband John, known by many as Jack, Spraggett in 1945 and thereafter supported him as a housewife though they had no children. They lived in a flat in Leamington when first married and then moved to a house in Villiers Street, Leamington where Freda cared for John and lived until she moved into Greenways Care Home at Long Itchington in 2018. John latterly had his own engineering business in Southam and they were able to afford many cruises around the Baltic and the Mediterranean until they were nearly 90. She is still an eager reader of her monthly copy of Stockton News. I wonder if Freda is the longest lived of any person ever born in Stockton?

## Stockton's Archives

### A WALK IN THE CHURCHYARD No. 5 MEMBERS OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE

There are three memorials to villagers who have been awarded the M.B.E. Charlie Gardner's cremated remains are buried in the Garden of Remembrance and the graves of Sidney Way and Major Weaver are in the last three rows of headstones at the far end of the churchyard.

**Charles Edward (Charlie) Gardner** was born on 16 June 1901. The Shire & Spire of September 1960 reports that "*Mr. Gardner and his wife built the bungalow themselves and it isn't quite like any other in the world, for Charles Gardner is a man who lives with wood. He has more kinds of wood in the house than you would think possible and as he says 'each gives us joy every minute'.* In a way its like a houseful of children for he knows every piece of wood by name, by feel, by touch and he knows the tree it came from and what the tree was like and where it stood. The window in his living room is tiled with 152 pieces of wood, all different.. Mr. Gardner has shown at so many Shows all over the country; he has met many people and to him they are all kind. But beside his work with wood Mr. Gardner is also the caretaker at the school. If Stockton cannot claim to be one of our prettiest villages it must surely have one of the prettiest school gardens in the county, where Mr. Gardner built the sandpit and helped to make the goldfish pool". Mr Gardner's bungalow was built at the end of Elm Row. He is pictured below with one of the many working models that he built in wood.

**Sidney James (Sid) Way** was a native of Devon and came to Stockton in 1923, and he and his wife ran the shop in The Square (now the Post Office) from around 1926. They had their own bakehouse and baked their own bread and cakes. Ken Russell later worked as a baker's boy for Mr. Way and when the Ways left to live in Leamington in 1956 Ken took over the shop with Maurice Turner.

Sidney Way served on Stockton Parish Council from 1934 until 1956, including 8 years as Chairman. He was first elected to Southam Rural District Council (RDC) in 1946 and then became vice-chairman in 1948 and chairman in 1950 until 1964 but remained on the RDC until 1970. During his early days on the RDC one of his main battles was to get a proper mains water supply and sanitation system to the Southam area and the surrounding villages. He was the founder Chairman of the Governors of Southam High School and a founder member of the South Warwickshire Water Board. He was awarded an MBE in 1970 for his services to local government.

The closure of the A425 between Southam & Ufton due to HS2 works is meant to end, with through access being restored in late July/early August. This is as a result of significant pressure from the group of local councillors around Southam, myself included, in the interest of local residents and businesses. I'm glad to see the change in their plans and will maintain pressure on HS2 in the interest of local residents as construction continues.

Large deliveries to the construction sites are continuing to allow for the tunnelling under Long Itchington Wood however the traffic should be routed to avoid impacting the local villages to a large extent, especially with the opening of the A425.

The South Warwickshire Local Plan consultation period, produced by Stratford & Warwick District Councils, closed on June 21st. I submitted comments to this on behalf of residents as part of my groups submission. These focused on protecting local communities from excessive housing development and improving the environmental impacts of development. I will provide an update once a response has been received.

The Covid case numbers have risen in Warwickshire, and nationally, since the easing of restrictions however Stratford & Warwick Districts are the lowest in the county which is encouraging for our area. It is worth noting that the number of patients in hospital locally is very low also.

Stratford District in particular has had a good uptake in vaccinations with around 80% of all adults having one dose and 60% having both doses at the time of writing. This being said people are still being asked to self-isolate if cases are detected and so caution is still required when making plans.

After a tough spring we are all welcoming some warmer weather and more freedoms so I hope you have a good summer, please stay safe.

Hello everyone, to update everyone, **the defibrillator planned for the village phone box** is currently on order and I am just waiting on a delivery, installation and training date.

The training to use the equipment will be for up to 50 volunteers and will be for anyone who would like the training and / or refresher training. Stockton Football & Cricket Club have kindly offered the club as a training venue (subject to Covid restrictions) and all trained volunteers will also be able to access the defibrillator at the Club as well as in the TK. This will ensure all areas of the village will have access to a defibrillator if required.

As well as volunteers for training to use the equipment, I need volunteers to complete a weekly check on the equipment. This will literally be a case of checking that the indicator light on the defibrillator is showing green (ok) or red (fault); if there is a fault then there will be a dedicated phone line to report it. If there are enough volunteers the checks should be split between everyone so it won't take up too much of your time.

Once the old telephone has been removed from the Telephone Kiosk it will be cleared, repaired and repainted.

The average **minimum temperature** was 6.2 deg. C, more than one degree below the average (7.5 deg.). The lowest temperature was 1.3 deg.C on the 2nd May.

The average **maximum temperature** was 14.8 deg.C, nearly two degrees below the average (16.6 deg.). The highest temperature was 22.6 deg.C on 31st May.

### YOUR LOCAL COUNCILLOR UPDATE – 20th June 2021

#### Covid19 (as at 18/6/21)

The rate of infections across the district has increased to 35/100,000 from 18 last week, the over 60's rate has remained the same at 5/100,000 (10 last week) with 2 cases over the last seven days. Other districts rates in Warwickshire for all ages are Nuneaton & Bedworth 101/100,000, North Warwickshire 29/100,000, Warwick 29/100,000 and Rugby 43/100,000. Warwickshire overall 49/100,000. England 75/100,000. All increasing except North Warwickshire.

There have been no further Covid related deaths across Stratford District this week, total now 141 from the start of this second wave (28<sup>th</sup> August 2020) 37 occurring in care homes, 91 in hospital, two in a hospice and 10 at home and one in a communal establishment, out of a total of 1,068 all cause deaths in the district for this new second wave period.

The cumulative total of deaths across Warwickshire for Wave 2 did not increase this week ( 676) with a total of 4,690 all cause deaths. The cumulative total of Covid-19 deaths in Stratford district is 309 since the start of the pandemic and in Warwickshire 1,277.


**District and County Council Matters** - the A 425 Southam to Leamington road should be re-opened by early August. The dropped kerb by the football club entrance should be fitted in the next few weeks. A new bollard is due to be fitted by the grass area at the end of George Street to prevent cars parking on the grass.

**Village facilities - Defibrillator:** work has started on refurbishing the old phone kiosk to house the defibrillator. Anybody who is interested in being trained to operate the device or to join a rota to provide regular checks on the equipment should contact Sue Coutts on 07763 597492. The **street lighting upgrades** will be carried out in September and include replacement of three old-style cast iron columns around the village and upgrade of sodium lights to LEDs in Elm Row. The refurbishment of the **electricity sub-station in School Street** should be completed sometime during the school holidays as it will require a full road closure to access cables in the road.

**Planning matters - 36 George Street (21/01304):** replacement of conservatory roof and garage, no representation by the parish council. **Land off Napton Road (21/01285):** proposed barn for agricultural purposes, objection lodged by the parish council as no need has been demonstrated. **40 George Street (21/01518):** flat roof dormer extension to create two additional dwellings and installation of dropped kerb to access car parking spaces: objection by the parish council on the grounds of intrusion over neighbouring properties, style of development out of keeping with the street scene and inadequate parking provision. **Land off Station Road (20/03594):** construction of race track for radio-controlled model cars, application withdrawn. **4 Rectory Close (21/01534):** two storey side extension, no representation by the parish council. **The Crown Inn (21/00306):** demolition of outbuildings and replacement with letting units and residential flats and construction of new detached commercial building, permission granted.

## Letter from Rev. Gillian Roberts

### Caring for God's creation

Over the past few months I have been able to spend some time in my garden. It isn't my favourite pastime but I have enjoyed building a stumpery in a dark, unused corner (nowhere near as grand as Prince Charles' stumpery at Highgrove!). I have planted lots of native ferns, spring bulbs, hostas, foxgloves and other flowers to attract the bees and other insects. (They even have their own bug hotel!)

Also, for my birthday, my grandchildren gave me a pack of seeds: purple carrots, rainbow chard, red sprouts, stripy tiger tomatoes and yellow courgettes! When they came to stay last month, they helped me sow the seeds. I hope they will enjoy harvesting them and eating what they have produced when they come to stay in the summer!

We are also undertaking some wildlife projects in our churchyards – allowing the grass and wild flowers to grow so we can do a survey of what's there. (Thank you so much for not getting too cross or upset when it has looked untidy!) We are also putting up some bird and bat boxes – hopefully involving the local schools and communities. And re-wilding some areas to allow wildlife to flourish, for nature to heal itself and restoring our relationship with the natural world.

Nature is our life support system, it's the air we breathe, the food we eat, the water we drink, the energy that sustains us. Right at the beginning of the bible, God calls us to care for creation, to be good stewards of his precious planet, to look after his fragile, wonderful world. But looking after the world should not come from a sense of duty but out of thankfulness for God's amazing love and generosity shown to us in his creation.
