NOTES OF AUGUST 2022 MEETING

Please note that these are an informal record. For a formal record please refer to the authorised minutes on our website.

Village Facilities: A426 Road Repairs - a complaint was made to the County Councillor about the closure of the road during daytime hours in contravention of the advertised closure. A complaint was also made about the **Post Office Lane road closure** and the length of time it took for the repair and the disruption that was caused to the bus service. **Severn Trent Water problems** - the parish council will write to the CEO asking for more details about the replacement of ageing pipework.

Planning Matters: Stockton Hall Farm - the Planning Department are now taking enforcement action against the owners of this site in relation to the unauthorised use of the driveway for HGV's and the development of the site from agricultural use. The planning application for further development of the site has not been validated and cannot go ahead. (22/01617) **Tollgate House** - demolition of existing garage and replacement with new double garage - application approved. (22/02332) **The Crown Inn** - replacement of unit - application approved. (22/02241) - **Windmill Farmhouse, Rugby Road** - erection of additional storey extension - prior approval granted. **Greenacre Barn, Napton Road** - excavation of pond - No representation by the parish council. (22/01967) **Lower Tomlow Farm** - conversion of roof space above garage into residential - although this property is in Napton Ward the parish council expressed its support for the application that would provide accommodation for a trainee farmer.

(22/01653) **Coventry Bridge Meadow** - proposed warehouse industrial units - although this site is in Napton Ward the parish council expressed its objection to an increase in heavy traffic through Stockton without any provision being made for traffic calming. **Radar Speed Signs** - a site visit will be arranged with the supplier of the equipment.

Annual Fee for Defibrillator - the parish council will find out what service is provided for this fee.

NOTES OF SEPTEMBER 2022 MEETING

Planning Matters: Stockton Hall Farm (unauthorised activity on the site) - a new planning application is due to be submitted. Stratford Planning believe this is the best way to deal with the enforcement issue. **Grange Farm, Tomlow Road** (22/00690), construction of agricultural worker's dwelling - the PC had no objections on the condition that an agricultural tie is placed on the new dwelling in perpetuity. **55 Elm Row** (22/02472), 1.5 storey rear extension - no

representation by the PC. **16 Tuckwell Close** (22/02620) , first floor front extension and upgrade of façade material - no representation by PC. **5 Victoria Terrace** (22/00902), construction of dropped kerb for vehicle access - permission refused. **Windmill Farmhouse, Rugby Road** (22/02253 and 22/02241) - permission granted.

Village facilities: **Memorial Green, Jubilee Fields** - the parish council confirmed that they had no objections to children playing on the Memorial Green or the Jubilee Green. **Churchyard Wall** - the chairman was authorised to have further discussions with the vicar and to report back over a request to help with funding to rebuild the brick wall to the north-east of the churchyard. **Children's Playing Field** - the PC agreed that some grant bids could be submitted by the parish council when this was preferred by the funding body. They also agreed that if a bid was submitted to the Veolia Trust for grants from the Landfill Tax that they would contribute the 10% share that was required in order to secure the 90% remainder. **Stockton FC&CC lease renewal** - the PC agreed to write to Ian Southcott at Cemex about the delays in negotiating the new lease. **Radar Speed Signs** - the PC discussed possible sites for the proposed signs and agreed to set up an online meeting with the supplier. **Defibrillator** - it has now been confirmed that the annual charge of £134 + VAT covers public liability insurance, theft and damage insurance, counselling services if needed, servicing and linking to the Ambulance Service systems.

Severn Trent Water - following the water stoppages this summer, Severn Trent have offered to attend a meeting so it was proposed to arrange this for Monday 19th December at 7.15 pm prior to the normal Parish Council meeting.

Next Meeting - 7.15 pm on Monday 17 October.

FREE MONEY (not really)

Councillor Grant Fund - Round 2 fund for 2022/23 launched on Monday 5th of September at 9am with a closing date of **Sunday 16 October at 5 pm**. The application process, as in previous years, will be online .

In short, the fund is aimed at community and voluntary organisations to support small-scale projects within my division that support the following outcomes:

We want Warwickshire to have a thriving economy and places that have the right jobs, skills, education and infrastructure.

We want to be a County where all people can live their best lives; where communities and individuals are supported to live safely, healthily, happily and independently.

We want to be a County with a sustainable future which means adapting to and mitigating climate change and meeting net zero commitments.

HS2 – A425 2 WAY TEMPORARY LIGHTS FROM 5/9/22 TO 25/11/22

Two-way temporary traffic lights are planned to be in operation along sections of A425 Leamington Road, from Monday 5 September 2022 until Friday 25 November 2022, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

This is to allow HS2 to begin construction of the temporary re-alignment of a new carriageway. Works already underway relating to the temporary re-alignment of a section of the A425 Leamington Road and the construction of the green tunnel under the existing carriageway.

To minimise potential disruption to the traffic flow, the two-way temporary traffic

lights will not be switched on in both locations at the same time.

I am pleased that I have been able their renewal from my delegated transport budget.

PAVEMENT PARKING/PARK IT RIGHT –

Every week, I get reports of some terrible parking – with cars blocking pavements (especially dropped kerbs), making it impossible for people with mobility scooters or with push chairs to get by, without going into the road. In some cases, too, emergency services vehicles (particularly fire appliances) would struggle to pass. PLEASE THINK OF OTHER PEOPLE, NOT JUST YOURSELF

PLEASE REPORT ANY ASB , however trivial it may seem. Small incidents can lead to bigger ones, so better to stop them before they escalate .Also, the more calls/incidents the Police have, the sooner they will realise there is a problem in a certain area. PLEASE ALSO ENSURE YOUR PROPERTY AND CAR IS LOCKED AND SECURE.

It is worth noting for future reference that anything immediately dangerous on the highway should be reported direct to the Police on 999, which is the same process for any pressing issue Out of Hours.

During normal office hours - 8:30am to 4:30pm, WCC call centre is best on 01926 412515

JOGGING – Please wear something that makes you easily seen, preferably use the paths wherever you can and if you do have to run on the road, it is advisable that you run on the right hand side of the road , facing the traffic (especially if wearing earphones and you can't hear traffic coming from behind).

Councillor groans –

I saw a sign that said, SQUIRRELS DRIVE SLOWLY. Very talented creatures. My dentist is also a dog walker, she once took both my canines out.

Finally I've been holding the contractor to account over the roadworks on the A426 – e.g. unsafe siting of road signs near crossroads, unauthorised road closure etc. Also I've trying to impress on WCC Highways/Transport – the significant impact on buses to the village during road closures in the village for utility works and for the need for them to be speedily expedited.

STOCKTON'S WEATHER STATION - AUGUST 2021

Headlines - Hot, dry, sunny - a real August !!!

In August the average **minimum temperature** was 14.6 deg.C, nearly two and a half degrees above the average (12.3 deg.C). The lowest overnight temperature was 9.1 deg.C on the 5th. The average **maximum temperature** was 25.0 deg.C, about three and a half degrees above the average (21.6 deg.). The highest temperature was 32.1 deg. C on the 12th and 13th August. **Rainfall** of 17. mm this month was less than one third of the average of 62.9mm. It only rained on seven days and the wettest day was the 16th with 10mm. The **wind** blew mostly from the north-west, west and south-west (18 days). It has been a very sunny month with **sunshine** hours being one third above the average.

The warmest January to August years since regional records began in 1892. Only two Augusts have been warmer since these records began (1995 and 1997)

The driest August since 1995.

The warmest August night (18.3 deg C on the 13th) since 2004.

We heard about the building of Clifton Suspension Bridge, the invention of the motor car, the hydrogen balloon, aeroplanes and saw slides of all kinds of flying contraptions. Also of interest was the suffragette movement, the slum clearance and building of council houses as well as the NHS.

Joan informed us that 14 of our members had taken part in the recent Produce Show and that Wendy Burrows was the WI overall winner with 12 points. Close runners up were Chris Millidge and Anthea Knight with 11 points each. Our craft stall at church had been a success and our scarecrow Matilda and Miss Trunchbull had been brilliant. Mary thanked everyone who made cakes and preserves for our festival stall.

Farewell to the Queen

It was with deep sadness that I heard of the death of her Majesty the Queen on 8th September.

As soon as the announcement was made, Operation London Bridge kicked into action and a whole process of arrangements had to be put into place, with guidance coming thick and fast from Lambeth Palace and the Diocese! There were short services of prayer and reflection held in our four larger churches. There were books of condolence, with the official photo of the Queen, and a place to lay floral tributes in each church. Arrangements were made for the bells to be tolled. And new plans were put in place for our Sunday services for the following two weeks – which focused on giving thanks for the life of the Queen, to remember those who are grieving and prayers for King Charles.

The Queen was such a special lady: devoted to the people of this country and the Commonwealth, a wise leader and a faithful Christian whose trust in God was the bedrock of her life of service. She lived out her faith every single day.

Many people have expressed to me that it feels like our “comfort blanket” has been pulled away. In this ever-changing and increasingly fragile world, it sometimes felt like the Queen was the only constant who could be relied on. It has brought out a great sense of loss, giving people permission to let go of grief not just for the Queen, but also other deeply held (often deeply hidden) losses in their own lives. Let’s be kind to each other at this time.

But in this time of grief and vulnerability, we can cling to the hope we find through Jesus, we can find hope even in the face of death.

“I am the resurrection and the life” says the Lord. “Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die.” [John 11:25]



It feels like, at long last, the pressure is reduced. The rush to get things done earlier in the year followed by the relentless watering during the heatwave. Were we all trying to keep some or all of our precious plants from dying due to lack of rain? Although there is always plenty to do it does seem more relaxed and leisurely and more pleasurable to catch up on some gardening after a long time when it was too hot to do anything. It might be best to wait and see which plants have survived and which haven't. It is encouraging to see fresh growth after the rain.

Here are a few reminders for this month.

Bulb planting should be well underway as long as the ground has softened up enough to make some planting holes.

Take cuttings of penstemons, salvias, pinks and gauras, put up to 10 cuttings round the edge of a 9cm pot and keep them damp, not too wet, and place in a cold frame, greenhouse or conservatory. They may well root in a few weeks.

If you have a lot of fallen leaves then rake up and add to the compost heap.

Cut down some but not all perennial plants, leaving some for wildlife to hibernate in.

Add compost or well rotted manure to the borders as much as you can, it will be good for the soil especially those of us on heavy clay.

If you get chance do visit one of the arborets to see autumn colours. I really like Bluebell Arboretum near Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

The club's Summer League ends on 30th September and Dave Hancox is Champion with a big lead of 92 points, well ahead of Anthea Sansom, Rich Rushton and Becky Rushton who are vying for second place.

The Club Singles League will continue until December 31st, and Dave Hancox is ahead in this also with 19 wins, well ahead of the 'pack' of Iain Cunningham, Rich Rushton and Becky Rushton who are vying for second place.

Fourteen players turned up for the melee on 3rd September and after three rounds there was just one unbeaten player – Bill Bentley. Well done to him. Seven players ended up with two wins, the best of these being Rich Rushton with a +17 points advantage, followed by Rita David with +9 and Diane Emberton with +7.

We hosted our Annual Open Triples on 29th August in excellent weather. We welcomed some new friends from Brackley and some old friends from our Half Crown days - Jerome Rousseau and Philippe Bonnet. We played five rounds followed by a grand final. The French team - Jerome and Philippe - were in fine form and were unbeaten in the qualifying rounds, including a 13-4 win against the other finalists - Rich and Becky Rushton, playing with Paula David. However, Becky found some excellent pointing in the final and the Stockton team outclassed the French team with a 13-2 win. Well done to The Rushtons in what was an excellent day's play.

We played the first round of the Euro Cup for Clubs on the morning of 27th August in a home match against Hampton-in-Arden. We fielded the Knights team and Yeomen team in what we thought was a strong squad. Unfortunately the Hampton squad was in great form and took the match by four games to one.

The next open melee will be on Saturday 1st October. Everyone is welcome – we will provide the boules and tuition in the rules.

Stockton's Archives

Taken from October Issues of Parish News 1970 -1979

Apple Curd

Mrs. R.T. Lowes

3lb of peeled, cored and sliced apples and put into saucepan with **½ pint water**. Simmer till cooked. Strain or beat well. Put back into pan with **1½ lb sugar**, bring to boil, then allow to simmer for 10 mins, stirring all the time. Add **4oz butter**, and stir until well blended. Add **2 egg yolks** well beaten. Cook without boiling, until mixture thickens. Pot hot in sterilised jars. Will only keep upto 4 weeks.

Apple Bread

Elizabeth Scruton

2 cups sifted plain flour	2tsp baking powder	pinch of salt
1 tbs sugar	2oz melted margarine	¾ cup of milk 1 egg

In a mixing bowl combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Beat the milk and egg together. Stir the liquid into the flour mixture to make a lumpy batter, stir in the margarine.

Butter a 9" square cake tin. Sprinkle the bottom with **½ cup sugar and ¼ tsp nutmeg**. Cover with 2 cups of sliced apples. Pour the batter evenly over the apples and bake at 375°F for 25-30 mins or until bread tests done. Turn out apple side up to cool.

Granny's Christmas Cake

¾ lb brown sugar	¾ lb butter	6 eggs	1lb Flour
1lb sultanas	1lb currants	¼ lb raisins	2ozs cherries
6ozs candied peel	¼ lb chopped almonds	½ tsp mixed spice	
2 tblsp treacle	1 glass brandy		
Tin 9" x3¼"			

Cream butter and sugar, add each egg separately and beat until stiff and uniform. Stir in flour, almonds, fruit, treacle and brandy. Transfer to tin, well lined with greased paper and bake for 6 hours and 20 mins at Regulo 1/250°F. Keep for 2or 3 weeks.

Half Quantity Tin 8" x 3" bake for 3hrs 45 mins.

Always put brown paper around outside of tin

Crunchy Cinnamon Cake

Cake

2oz butter	4oz caster sugar	1 egg	4oz S.R. flour
2½ fl oz milk			

Topping

3oz soft brown sugar	1oz plain flour	1tsp ground cinnamon
1oz butter	2oz walnuts coarsely chopped	

Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Add the egg and 1 tablespoon of flour and beat well. Fold in remaining flour and milk. Spread half this over the base of a greased and lined 8" sandwich tin. Place the topping ingredients in a saucepan and stir until melted. Cool slightly and spread half over the cake mixture. Cover with remaining cake mixture. Complete cake with final layer of topping. Bake in moderate oven 350°F or gas mark 4 for 30 - 40 mins. Cool on wire rack before serving.

Stockton means Cowtown - ton is Saxon for Town and Stock for Cattle. The Tower and Chancel of the Church are 15th Century. That the Southam R.D.C. in a rough reckoning in 1970 estimated Stockton population as 1,008.

1972

Old Stockton

There may be older cottages, messuages or tenements in Stockton but Mr. & Mrs Archie Lay's cottage must go on record as it will disappear for ever in the not too far distant future. I wonder how many other dwellings in Stockton can claim not only to be old but also to have their history recorded and preserved to the present day in deeds, indentures and covenants? The documents relating to the Lay's cottage and to others go back over two centuries to 1750.

First, a word about Mrs. Lay's own associations with the cottage. She came to live there as a girl of eleven or twelve. In actual fact, what is now seen as one cottage, was once two cottages: one being one up one down. Mrs. Lay can remember the time when there was a choice of two staircases! At one time, nine people, four generations, lived under the one roof, through from Granny to two great-grandchildren (*three of these being my mum, dad and sister ~ Ed*).

Until 1952 there was neither electricity or running water. The pump was always at hand! Electricity and water both came with the advent of St. Michael's Crescent. Living in one cottage most of her life, Mrs. Lay has certainly seen her way of life change dramatically.

To go back, how different it was a century ago to buy a cottage. In 1873, when the Lay's cottage and one other were bought by a Miss Sarah Hawkes, the purchase price was a mere £194 - £64 a cottage! (The bidding was not high enough at the auction at the Barley Mow, so the cottages were later sold

privately to Miss Hawkes). Neither did houses increase in value at 30% a year, for in 1843 one of the cottages on that piece of land was sold for £65. By the way, that mortgage for £65 only cost 5% per year in interest!

This is not to say that there are no similarities with house buying today. The deeds, conveyances and indentures relating to the Lay's cottage are couched in the same legal vocabulary as we know today - and are just as incomprehensible and repetitive to the layman.

From documents I gathered at least that people of varying occupations have lived on that plot of land, constructing various workshops, pigsty's etc. at different times, according to the tools of their trade. Some yeomen, a farmer, a besom maker, a tanner and a shoe-maker have resided in their turn.

Amongst the papers is the insurance plaque - in this case, County Fire - that was fixed to the outside wall in times past. In those days, your house was simply allowed to burn down if the passing fire engine (all of them belonged to the insurance companies) was not owned by the company with which you were insured!

The Lay's cottage, however, escaped destruction by fire. Now in its ripe old age it will be the unfortunate victim of a demolition gang. Like all of life, it returns to dust and illustrates once more that everything, us included, is here only for its allotted span.

Middle School - Transporting of the children to the new middle school (*Long Itchington*) seemed to be going smoothly but the Parish Council would like to get a shelter erected for them before the winter sets in.

Refuse - Household or garden rubbish can now be deposited in two skips at the Dunchurch end of the old tip and the gates are open on Saturday and Sunday mornings.

Water - During the summer dry spell the upper parts of the village had great difficulty in getting any water, the matter has now been taken up by County Councillor.

Playing Field - After much discussion it has been decided that the hedge between the playing field and the football field will not be removed, so the children's area will remain quite separate. The Playing Field Committee and the Parish Council have received a number of complaints about dogs being exercised in the playing field, also about youths on bicycles and mopeds riding about the play area, this is extremely dangerous to the small ones, so take your bikes up the drive, but leave them by the pavilion.
