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

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more fearful for my own safety with that edge on such heavy axes as he favoured, and remembering that snick on his hand was bothered about my leg if I made the slightest error.

'You'll be all right,' Tom says consolingly, and after a short spell of trepidation getting the feel of the thing, I found it marvellous: its own weight with that edge snicked off surprising big chunks at one stroke. All the same, for comfort in regular use I'd stick to my own smaller blade. Tom's could be as worrying as a sawbench, and I hadn't to take trees down like him, only trim the cordwood. On the other side of this firewooding, the delivery side, I made many good customers and, even better, many good friends and acquaintances. Until the second war came along I worked a fortnightly delivery, that was Stockton, Bishop's Itchington and Harbury one week; Southam, Napton and Prior's Marston the other.

'Lall' Tranter of Rugby, who dabbled in that sort of thing, fixed me up with a better replacement for my old Ford 'tonner' after a couple of years at this job, and he laughed at a later meeting when he related to me how he, having taken my old vehicle in part exchange, had gone on to a wedding that day and had turned up at the ceremony with it belching steam from the radiator like a railway engine. But then, you had to live with your 'tonner' in constant comradeship in those days to know of all their little foibles, to be able to coax and pamper the best out of them. Talk about an education in mechanics! I had soon found that one couldn't for ever be calling in the aid of the professionals from the garages, which was ruinous and inconvenient, and made inroads into the cash one needed to live on.

I am now convinced that it was realising this sort of thing early enough that enabled me to make my living at all and provided the reason why I was able to withstand the inevitable competition that came up from time to time. My competitors would be carried away with the glamour of the new lorries, so strongly impressed on them by the skilled salesmen who naturally pounced on us, seeing us about with our old crocks, but I soon learnt the answers to their blandishments. 'You needn't pay down,' they would argue; something above £4 a week in instalments, I believe, which was just about all the profit one could make on the job, and which constituted a fair living at that time. 'And look what you've got when you've paid for it!' they would continue. I was bucked when I realised the answer to that one, which was: 'Oh. no! That's where you're wrong! By the time I've paid for it, I shall have a vehicle like this one!' After many years I amused myself by having a reckon-up and found my old vehicles had cost me, without running expenses, only a shilling a week to buy.

timber, bucking and rearing, yet there's a touch of sadness at the passing of the other.

There was old 'Shakes' (short for 'Shakespeare') in Crackley Wood; not the poet, but the horse named after him. This was some time later and Spa and Warwick had set up a portable engine and sawbench in the wood, and I was fetching away the offcuts. 'Shakes' in contrast to the remarkable contrast to that team effort at Princethorpe, was an equally efficient solo exponent. Worth his weight in gold, as the chaps said. One had to watch him to realise the skill he was capable of, as he lugged the trimmed trees to the sawbench. He seldom needed a word from his driver as his chain was coupled to the log and he set off, gently laying into his collar and sometimes almost on his knees as he put his weight into the business, and watch him negotiate the stumps of the felled trees or any other obstacles; his wisdom in realising the length of the tow-chain so that he started to pull left or right in good time to miss them; and his instant understanding of the futility of wasting his strength when the log did foul anything, when he would stand and wait patiently for his human colleague's helping hand. I even question whether mechanisation could supersede him in those circumstances, though I must concede I had been too hasty in stating that that team of twelve could never be replaced by a machine. But it was, and I hadn't foreseen the idea of the winding-gear and its long tow-rope which didn't chew up the ground like the horses' hooves. Neither had I foreseen the anchoring down of the tractor to prevent the little thing being dragged back rather than the heavy timber brought forward.

Once I had some treetops to cut out myself in a spinney some fields off the road, Marton way, whose entrance was by the old toll-house. I believe it was February time, and surprisingly the turf was hard enough to begin with; we had had an unusually dry spell for that time of year, but the weather eventually broke and drove me back to the sawmill stuff, luckily available just then, and the vagaries of that season's weather prevented me resuming at this spinney until June. But the point I wanted to relate was to bring in old Tom Higginson, who had some fame as a prince of 'fallers' (perhaps 'fellers' is more correct but in our area they were called by the former name). At this time Tom hadn't quite finished his part in the business and now and then I had a word with him, and had noted his extreme care of his tools. You can realise that when I mention that he would finish his axe-edges on a razor hone. I don't know if others in his line did that, but he did and I had seen one day frightening evidence when, skilled as he was, he looked up at me in conversation whilst honing away, and the merest touch on the blade of his axe lifted a chunk of flesh on the ball of his thumb.

So, when another day I went off without my own axe. I thought I'd see if Tom had an old one to loan me, and he says: 'No, no old axe; take one of these', I was startled that such a particular chap would trust me with the thing, risking that razor-edge of his careful nursing, and making me fearful that I might damage it. On his assurance that he wasn't worried on that score I was no end

Another relative of mine was to emphasise my ignorance of country matters that should have been inherent to my country breeding. There was my father with his birds, my cousin Fred (with Denny Hardwick) on the habits of wild duck, and now another cousin. Charlie Neal, bred on that New Zealand Farm we have talked about, had to teach me a trifle on rabbits' habits. He accompanied me now and then when he could be spared from the farm (sometimes his brother Tom did so, too) and it was on that same stack of cordwood concerned in our last adventure that he had remarked that he daresay I had found bags of rabbits. Oh, I had seen plenty, but they never waited for me to catch them. I had seen a stoat pounce on a pretty little young one that had inadvertently wandered out of the stack; so deadly was his pounce that I thought it best not to disturb him and thus prolong the youngster's agony. But I couldn't pounce like that! and had wondered how one set about catching the things, until Charlie on his first visit here – I must have made scores of visits, all fruitless – taught me a thing or two, and in a few moments had a victim in his hands. A quick glance round had drawn from him the remark: 'I'll bet there's one in here; could be eight or nine, no telling', and sure enough he draws one out of the hole in question. Now how did he know that? I ask. There was no end of holes which we had previously uncovered as we had loaded from the stack, so how do I know which are occupied? 'Why, look here,' says Chas, and draws my attention to an odd hair from the fur of a rabbit at the entrance to the run, which he begs me to note is a clean new hair, and there you are. Talk about attention to details! It's a queer thing that I could have shown cousin Charlie how to produce rabbits out of a top hat, and I daresay I had done so at some time or other, but his was

The bulk of this cordwood at Princethorpe had come from the wood at the far end of the lane, and the timber hauliers were still drawing out the trimmed timber for the sawmills, and here I saw the sight of a lifetime, which I doubt I shall ever seen again: a twelve-horse timber team lugging out the loaded carriage. The weather had broken by then and the continual drawing-out of the timber had churned up the end of the lane that ran into the wood until the axles of the carriage were dragging through the mud. There was something thrilling in watching this sight: the marvellous perfection of each member of the team in responding to the orders shouted by their attendant who – so expert himself – walked some distance away in the wood on clean solid ground whilst his equally experienced charges were wallowing in the mud up to their bellies, all pulling their weight in faultless unison – no snatch or jerking – flawless

Modern mechanisation gives me some mixed thoughts: no doubt often sparing hard-worked animals, sometimes amounting to ill-treatment (though I think it very doubtful that the timber-team handlers, who had such an affinity with the horses, probably stemming from the pride in the perfect product of their efforts, would have stood for that) and I must grant, too, that it's no mean spectacle to watch a comparatively small timber-tractor anchoring down and fighting out the

The season was nearing the winter-time and I kept wondering whether I would clear this particular stack before the weather broke and prevented me getting off the turf with my load. Time and again I had the satisfaction of thinking 'that's one more load nearer' as I found my wheels on the hard road once more; and the winter and dark evenings drew nearer, and the turf gradually softened. Still I kept getting off, sometimes when I had hardly hoped to. Then this memorable day I had gone alone – on occasions I had a little temporary hired help; only one or two loads left now, and I loaded up, which could be hard work enough, roped my double stack on and started up the engine. My wheel spun; I stopped immediately as I had enough experience now to avoid the error of grinding oneself in deeper. So I laid pieces of bark behind the wheel and tried reversing; the other wheel spun, so to work with the jack. I don't know if you've ever tried this sort of thing on softened turf: your jack pushes into the ground so you find chips of wood, brick ends, stones or whatnot and they push into the ground until you have pushed enough in to hold up. Finally you get the wheel up and something you hope to bite on under it. In the course of time I get two wheels up. And have thrown off some of my load from the rear stack. Try again and find that the front wheels have sunk in. Jacking commences afresh and numerous and various solid articles are pushed into the ground; more and more of my laborious loading is undone until I have thrown off all the load and still the empty lorry spins its wheels, which have now become so muddied they refuse to grip.

By this time night is approaching and I am getting anxious as my lights happen to be out of order, not having been needed for some time and awaiting first chance of repair. Then a farm chap is seen at last – I don't remember seeing another fellow creature all that time – but no tractor is available, and he suggests that I walk across the field and collect an armful of straw from the rick over there. Not too hopefully I take his advice as I could think of no alternative. Lo and behold! It works; it gives me a bite and I'm away backwards and daren't stop backing, fearful of spin again, until I'm near the slope to the gate. Must have looked funny but never mind, we're on the road and just time to get home before dusk. No time to throw any of our wood over the hedge and ditch to load on the road, which little task we have often been driven to do, but go home empty. And there we were: one whole day's work for nothing, in fact worse than that if you consider the petrol and running expenses. I'd have been better off if I had sat at home with a book, but at least I was grateful to get home before the problem of the lights arose.



We have also been successful in applying for funding from the National Lottery Community Fund towards the cost of replacing the floor – more on this project to follow soon.

Brought up on an isolated farm in the Blackdown Hills of Devon. Chris honed his skills as a Wheelwright. With the decline of carts with wooden wheels however, Chris answered an advert seeking work on the canals. Although many canals had been left to decline in 1948, cargoes were still being carried on the bigger canals up until the 1990s. He also found work on a community boat and butty pair "Lapwing" and this is where he met his wife Gill. The boat was used for Guide and Scout group holidays but also for party trips too. Chris loved the waterways and engineering so decided to build his own steam boat called "Adamant" and Chris and Gill lived aboard until the imminent arrival of their first child. After moving to George Street, Chris continued to work on the canal, maintaining locks, clearing blockages and keeping the canal flowing. One of the jobs he was involved with was keeping the flow of water between Leamington and Calcutt. This involved installing massive pumps to get the water back up to the Top Lock at Calcutt.

Chris' slides depicted both the "Beauty and the Beast" sides of canal life, the brutality of the cold hard winters and back breaking work for the peace and tranquility of life "on the Cut". Thank you Chris for donating your time and fee and we hope you enjoyed your carrot cake! A very enjoyable evening. Thanks also go to the Pétanque Club for our very enjoyable afternoon recently and in particular to Anthea and Diane for their help with setting up and the tuition of this entertaining game. We are also very grateful to Joan for baking and supplying us with her delicious cakes at these events.

Headlines - a very average month with all temperatures very close to the long term averages

In September the average minimum temperature was 10.6 deg. C, very close to the average (10.4 deg. C.). The lowest temperature was 4.3 deg. on the 21st. The average maximum temperature was 19.0 deg. C, just above the average (18.7 deg.C.). The highest temperature was 23.4 deg. on the 7th. Rainfall was 38mm, two thirds of the September average of 58 mm. The wettest day was the 14th with 12mm. It rained on 9 days. Sunshine levels were identical to the average. Winds blew mostly from the west, south west and south (20 days). Trivia of the month - last year between 21st - 26th of the month 122mm of

rain fell, but during the same period this year we had not a drop.

At the meeting Mr Careford said that some difficult decisions may need to made to boost our 5YHLS as quickly as possible, in order regain more control over the planning process. This control has recently been diminished by the Appeal decision that effectively reduced our 5YHLS to 2.74 years.

As Ward Member (and a long serving Southam District Councillor) for the area Wood St Car park is in, it was a pity no one saw fit to seek my views before it was included in the report.

I note it was included as Amber, I'd heard it was originally proposed to be delegated as Green.

Whilst some of the concerns that I raised at Cabinet were answered, I didn't hear (maybe I missed it) any rebuttal of the potential to build houses on Wood St. Please could you confirm how likely this site is to be taken forward. If not, you may have set hares running unnecessarily. It may have sensible to have had some narrative about it in the report.

I and Cllr Bromwich have raised the need to protect and maintain the status quo around Wood St Car park. This has garnered significant support from Southam residents and surrounding villages, both on Facebook and in emails (which I can share with you). The support indicates that it is a valued community facility and that it is vital to the well-being of Southam and surrounding villages.

Please reply at your earliest convenience so that Cllr Bromwich and I can reassure residents that the long term future of Wood St Car Park has been safeguarded.

Just to provide some comfort, the sites listed in the Cabinet Report represent an initial high-level assessment of potential sources of supply. Their inclusion does not mean that they will come forward for development – rather it was intended to demonstrate the some of the potential sources of supply as well as the scale of the challenge we face.

So, whilst I can categorically state that it is not definite that it would come forward (and give you some comfort), equally, I can't definitively rule it out either. But that is true for all sites.

Ultimately it will be for the landowner as to whether they wish to pursue an application on the site, but the concerns you have raised about its value have

STOCKTON PARISH COUNCIL - OCTOBER 2025 MEETING

District and County Council Matters;

The study into safety issues at **Stockton crossroads** should be made available by the end of October.

Local Government Devolution: the County Council have decided to put forward a proposal to have a single unitary authority covering the whole of the county. Rugby Council have yet to make their decision but the other district councils are proposing two unitaries to cover the north and the south of the county. Formal submissions have to be made to central government by the end of November.

Cllr Crump is looking into strengthening of the **verge opposite The Crown in High Street**.

Stockton Football & Cricket Club Lease - The negotiations over a new lease between Cemex and SFCC are nearing completion with the only outstanding issue being a requirement from Cemex that a fence has to be erected between the two fields.

Stockton Road Safety Group - The group has asked about the possibility of a cycle track/footpath between Stockton and Southam. The parish council agreed to look out any papers that still exist in relation to a similar proposal that was investigated about 20 years ago. This found that the main issues were the choice of the route, either next to the A 426 or across the fields to follow the existing footpath, and also how to cross the Southam bypass.

Planning Matters:

- **3 Mount Pleasant** loft conversion (25/02008); this does not need planning permission and is given a certificate of lawful development.
- **42 Post Office Lane:** demolition of existing dwelling and erection of three new dwellings (25/02247); the Parish council resolved to support this application.

Land to the west of Napton Road, construction of up to 9 dwellings (25/02294); the Parish Council resolved to object to this application on the grounds that it lies outside the village boundary, the strain on existing infrastructure that the proposal does not seek to improve, and the lack of reference to the results of the Parish Housing Needs Survey in 2021. However, given the lack of the minimum requirement for a 5 year housing land supply in the Stratford area, the Parish Council have asked that if Stratford are minded to approve the application then the developer should be required to include some form of community benefit such as, for example, a bus turn around point, traffic calming measures or improvements to the children's playing field.

Village Facilities:

Warwickshire Highways will be asked to put down white line road markings at the **junction between Sycamore Close and Laurel Drive** following a complaint from a resident about recent near misses.

Litter bin on The Green: Stratford DC will be asked to replace the bin that is showing signs of corrosion.

Warwickshire Highways will be asked to repaint the **yellow zig-zag lines outside Stockton School.**

Light in Rectory Close that is obscured by tree branches - this is being referred to Warwickshire Highways as the tree has a tree preservation order. Stratford DC has a fund for **new village noticeboards** and this will be investigated for a possible replacement for the noticeboard that used to be sited on the Post Office wall.

Wood Street Car Park, Southam: following proposals that this might be redeveloped for housing the Parish Council will write to Stratford DC about the impact on Stockton residents with the loss of parking to access the library chemist, shops and other facilities.
